





What is KYW?

Kentuckyvired IS...

- A state-owned physical fiber optic network; conduit for transmitting data.
- Open access; providers can connect equipment to KYW then build fiber to homes and businesses in a community.
- Wholesale provider of network capacity to providers; frees providers to invest in extending local fiber networks & growing their customer base.
- Presence in all 120 counties.
- Combining public and private funding resources.


Kentuckyvired IS NOT...

- An Internet service provider to individuals.
- Building fiber to individual homes or private businesses.





Map with Rings






Third Party Agreements

- ➤ In an effort to minimize cost and engage private businesses, we are committed to partnering with Kentucky's telecommunications service providers, local municipals, and rural electric cooperative companies to leverage existing infrastructure.
- ➤ We recently signed a Strategic Agreement with Cincinnati Bell to partner on construction costs in northern Kentucky.
 - * This agreement will save approximately \$3 million in project construction costs.
 - ❖ This portion of the network will play a crucial role in the broadband expansion in Eastern Kentucky and the I-75 corridor because it is critical to bringing state government sites online, connecting the network to the Internet, and providing redundancy for the network.
- ➤ We have also signed a Letter of Intent to partner with East Kentucky Network (or "EKN") on broadband network construction in Eastern Kentucky. EKN represents a consortium of five incumbent service providers with coverage in 21 counties.



Mission: Support Economic Development and Job Readiness

Supports the SOAR Regional Goals and leverages KYW as an openaccess, middle mile fiber network which will provide high speed, high capacity broadband services.

- ➤ E-Commerce and training support provided through a partnership with the Education and Workforce Development Cabinet (EWDC)
 - EWDC has partnered with Eastern Kentucky Concentrated Employment Program (EKCEP)
- Community Internet Access Centers includes support for each IAC, digital literacy, education and outreach services.
- ➤ Work is underway to create Partnership with local ISP providers that provide critical last mile services.



Mission: Support Economic Development and Job Readiness

Community Planning & Support covers 54 counties with a concentrated focus on 23 severely economically distressed counties.

- Three (3) statewide contracts awarded to vendors to support community level fiber planning.
 - Three (3) pilot engagements, which includes 10 counties and the City of Ashland.
 - Strategies, frameworks and work items produced during these engagements will serve as models for other communities.



Mission: Support Economic Development and Job Readiness

Community Based Internet Access Centers (Broadband Adoption Pilot) includes support for each IAC, digital literacy, education and outreach services.

- Primary focus is 12 distressed Eastern Kentucky counties, however broadband education & outreach are statewide
 - Computer delivery is underway
 - ❖ Wireless support needs assessment completed August 15th
 - Digital Literacy Training to start Fall 2016



Mission: Support Economic Development and Job Readiness

E-Commerce Training for Businesses & Entrepreneurs

KCNA in partnership with the Education and Workforce Development Cabinet and the East Kentucky Concentrated Employment Program (EKCEP) will help businesses and communities in Eastern Kentucky grow e-commerce jobs.

- Businesses in Eastern Kentucky have been selected to receive e-commerce training to increase global marketing capability, product development, production efficiencies, and process improvement.
- Expected outcomes are the creation, saving or expansion of job opportunities. Monthly training programs will support broadband usage and adoption for job readiness, job placement, and e-commerce purposes.

FRANKFORT, KY (June 3, 2016) — Kentucky Communications Network Authority (KCNA) today announced the

Commonwealth will enter into a strategic agreement with Cincinnati Bell to partner on broadband network construction in northern Kentucky.

Cincinnati Bell provides integrated telecommunications solutions – including voice, data, high-speed Internet and video – to consumers and business customers across Greater Cincinnati and Northern Kentucky.

"Kentuckians will benefit from this agreement in two ways," said executive director Chris Moore. "Firstly, by partnering with Cincinnati Bell and leveraging existing infrastructure, project construction costs will be reduced by approximately \$3,000,000. The agreement highlights our ongoing commitment to work with existing infrastructure companies to efficiently and economically improve broadband services in the Commonwealth."
